

We are going to learn about the different ways we have communicated without words throughout our history. This knowledge will help you break the riddles and decode the messages to save our artifacts and local history.



SECRET CODES - DAY 2

Today's activity:

Morse code is made up of a series of dits (dots) and dahs (line). Today we need to decode this message to save this well known company.

The Gibbard factory started building this item in downtown Napanee in 1835.


In 1836 Samuel Morse developed the system of sending information over wires, done through a series of electrical signals. Morse code made it possible for people to communicate over far distances. This made it possible for the railroad to be built across Canada. In 1856 the train first arrived in Napanee with the first telegraph office being established shortly after. The railway was important in the development of Napanee.



In the 1870's what Napanee company started to import and produce tea?



The people who first settled in Napanee in the 1780's were United Empire _ _ _ _ _ _ _ _ _ _.




Developed in 1857 and is used on ships to communicate to other ships while traveling. Before the time of cell phones and radio communication, boats needed to be able to communicate over the large bodies of water. Used in case of emergencies, or to share information, it was also used as a code as different countries have different symbols. This means of communication is still used today by large boats and the Navy.


